
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OUR GUIDING PRINCIPLE

Ofsted's Insights and Research (I&R) Directorate

What is the I&R Directorate?

- A new directorate created earlier in 2022 led by Alex Jones
- Provides data, analysis, research and evaluation across all remits.
- Works in partnership with inspectors

Data & Insight (D&I)

- Led by Jason Bradbury, Chief Statistician oversees 100 statisticians, analysts and data scientists
- Delivers pre-inspection information and advice
- Provides analysis of inspection evidence and outcomes
- Publishes around 70 statistical releases each year
- Carry out quantitative analysis for example, the relationship between inspection judgements/evidence and pupils' future outcomes, using longitudinal data
- Provide analytical support to regional teams

Research & Evaluation (R&E)


- Led by Dr Verena Braehler, oversees 45 social researchers
- Leads on developing evidence base and fill knowledge gaps
- Evaluates policy and practice to understand what works
- Publishes around 30 research reports each year
- Oversees production of Ofsted's Annual Report

A big example of Ofsted research



Independent review of tutoring in schools and 16 to 19 providers

- Two-year evaluation to assess the progress and effectiveness of the government's £1 billion tutoring catch up programme
- Evaluation funded by the Department for Education at a cost of circa £1.9 million
- Delivered by Ofsted researchers and inspectors
 - Research team (approximately 950 days) manage project, develop research tools, analyse data, write published reports
 - Inspectors (approximately 850 days) collect data during research visits to schools and 16-19 providers: over 63 visits in 2021-22, around 80 planned for 2022-23
- Impact of first year:
 - Termly real-time insights for the Department on how tutoring programme is working
 - Yearly published report generating significant media, sector and public interest
 - Also influenced Ofsted inspection practice: tutoring cannot make up for deficits in weak curriculum



How do we deliver a big research project?







A very small example of Ofsted research

Roundtable discussions with Senior His Majesty's Inspectors to inform Ofsted's Annual Report

- Internal roundtable discussions to test and bring to life key themes for the Annual Report ahead of publication
- Delivered online, 1 hour each for 4 different remits
- Participants: Chief Inspector, 8 senior inspectors per remit, 1-2 researchers
- Cost: £5K

Competing priorities: Shift good governance long


Shifting landscape: mix of short- and long-term projects; break points

More detail on the cost of research



• We tailor the research methodology to the research question

Core costs

- Inspector time (£1,000 / day)
- In-house researcher time (£250 / day)
- Externally commissioned researcher (£300-1,000 / day)
- Travel and hotel costs for field research

Other costs / considerations

- Research ethics adviser / academic peer reviewer (£500 / day)
- Journal subscriptions, software packages
- Time and expertise from other business areas, e.g. procurements
- Partnerships and secondments with other organisations
- Receiving funding from other government departments
